


Conference Topic Descriptions

AGRICULTURE

Being in Lancaster, it is no surprise that we have a robust agriculture focus! Join these sessions to learn about innovative tools, communications techniques, and unique collaborations that connect agriculture to conservation and clean water protection.

COMMUNICATIONS

These sessions will help participants expand their knowledge and increase their capacity around strategic communications. Join these sessions to learn how to be your own communications professional! Extra bonus: We are excited to have The Hatcher Group join us for a two-hour workshop on press outreach for beginners.

EQUITY

These sessions seek to further the Coalition and our members' focus on Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Justice (DEIJ) by providing deep-dives into a variety of topics. Don't miss a twohour workshop on authentic community engagement as well as sessions highlighting projects that are furthering DEIJ, including the work of the Coalition and the Chesapeake Bay Funders Network to broaden our tent in the Chesapeake Bay watershed.

OUR POWER

In order to help participants understand what it means to connect our power, this topic will highlight examples of our members and partners collaborating with a variety of stakeholders to accomplish a common goal. Attendees will hear from a wide range of presenters, including Coalition members, the faith community, and DEIJ experts.

PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT

Our movement is nothing without the dedicated members of the public who make our restoration dreams a reality. This is why we are hosting the First-ever public engagement focus at our conference. Join these sessions to learn more about unique ways to engage your current and new audiences to further conservation goals.

PIPELINES

This year's shale workshop is focused on bringing together pipeline fighters across the watershed to discuss their work, find common themes, compare approaches, and learn from one another. Come learn more about the variety of approaches community groups and non-profit organizations are taking in the fight against pipelines; you might just learn something new!

STORMWATER

Interested in learning from experts about stormwater issues facing the Chesapeake Bay watershed? Want to hear more about innovative solutions to reducing this source of pollution? If you answered yes to either of these questions, join sessions with a stormwater focus this year!

CHESAPEAKE BLUEPRINT

2018 marks the release of the midpoint assessment results for the Chesapeake Bay clean up. It is critical that the Chesapeake Bay community is coordinated in our response and continues to work toward 2025. Join the Blueprint sessions for more information on how you can be part of meeting our clean water goals.



Don't be Fazed by Phase III

Sub-topics: Agriculture, Stormwater, Public Engagement,

Communications, Our Power

The midpoint assessment and Phase III Watershed Implementation Plans (WIPs) are an important opportunity for the Choose Clean Water Coalition to influence the second half of the Chesapeake Bay TMDL. To take advantage of this opportunity, the Coalition is developing an advocacy plan with the goal of supporting each state in meeting its 2025 goals. The plan is designed to identify leverage points and advocacy opportunities that will help shape the midpoint assessment decisions and WIP development processes, and set the stage for more targeted state-level advocacy on the issues that will be needed to achieve WIP commitments and TMDL goals. Join this workshop to hear an update from the previous director of the Chesapeake Bay Program, Nick DiPasquale, on the progress of the TMDL, learn about important aspects of successful WIP development and implementation, and provide your input on the Coalition's advocacy plan. Participants will have the opportunity to work with state-specific breakout groups to determine key actions in their state and ensure their states actions are included in the watershed-wide approach.

Economical BMP Implementation through Science Based Modeling Sub-topics: Communications, Stormwater

East Lampeter Township in Lancaster County with 140+ Old Order Amish farmers presents a challenge regarding outreach, engagement and BMP implementation. Lancaster Farmland Trust utilized a farm-to-farm, face-to-face approach to gather data related to BMPs on all farms. The data collected was processed via a modelling program to identify cost-effective BMPs to make water quality improvements, while simultaneously assisting the township with MS4 compliance.

Making Your Campaign Newsworthy **Sub-topic: Public Engagement**

In a world where many of the policies around which we work seem difficult or obscure to the general public, how do we make them compelling, newsworthy and comprehensible to the general public? We'll use the case study of PennEnvironment's series of reports entitled "Rough Waters Ahead", which told the story of the impact that proposed cuts to the EPA budget would have on the watersheds of the Susquehanna, the Delaware River, Lake Erie, and Pittsburgh's Three Rivers and their tributaries. This presentation will discuss strategies to improve the likelihood of news coverage, and to garner support and understanding from the general public for policy issues that can often be complicated and confusing.

Targeting Industrial Stormwater **Sub-topics: Our Power, Equity**

Location: Independence Room

Like construction sites and city streets, many industrial facilities are regulated by state permits for polluted stormwater discharges. But no two industrial facilities are the same and the types of toxic pollutants discharged are varied. Industrial stormwater discharges can be substantial sources of contamination for rural, suburban, and urban waterways. In communities with high densities of industrial facilities, the public health ramifications of industrial stormwater regulation may be less familiar than that of air pollution, but they are not insignificant. This session will provide a 'soup-to-nuts' primer on industrial stormwater for advocates, focused on understanding the pollution source, how it is regulated, and how advocates can ensure accountability and pollution reductions through permit and enforcement advocacy.

Paddling, Macros and Snorkeling, Oh My!

Hosted by: NorthBay, Lower Susquehanna Riverkeeper, Audubon Naturalist Society, Shanks Mare

Forming bonds with a river is a critical first step to motivating people to protect it. There are a number of ways to do this. Paddling on their surface and exploring the life contained in them through benthic macro invertebrate exploration are two traditional ways. Snorkeling is a more novel approach and allows people to experience rivers and the life in them on their terms. We will paddle the Susquehanna River from Shanks Mare Outfitter to Fishing Creek where will explore the benthic macroinvertebrate community, and if conditions allow, snorkel the stream to experience this amazing underwater community.

Franklin & Marshall Green Walking Tour

Hosted by: Franklin & Marshall

This is a walking tour of campus and the adjacent city park. Included will be rain gardens, green roofs, permeable pavement, swales and more. The theme will be the college's effort to reduce stormwater runoff and its harmful effect on streams and the Chesapeake Bay. Mention will be made of work by F&M professors in the field of dam removal and wetland restoration as well as the college's efforts to conserve water.

Susquehanna Petroglyphs Paddling Experience

(Needs to meet at Commons on Vine at 1:30 p.m.)

Hosted by: Chesapeake Bay Foundation, State Museum of Pennsylvania

After a short safety/instructional discussion, participants will paddle from the Safe Harbor Recreation Area on the Conestoga Creek to the Susquehanna River where they will visit a small rock outcrop in the middle of the river. The site is covered with petroglyphs produced by early Native Americans. This two hour paddle should be comfortable for paddlers with limited experience.

Good Food, Healthy Farms, & Clean Water

Hosted by: Lancaster Farmland Trust

This mobile seminar, hosted by Lancaster Farmland Trust, will introduce attendees to Lancaster County agriculture as an integral part of a local food system. Attendees will learn about farmland preservation, agricultural production, the Amish farming community, and sustainable farming practices that position agriculture as a solution to water pollution. Participants will visit Lancaster Central Market, the country's oldest farmers' market; Lancaster Farm Fresh Cooperative, a non-profit organic farmers' cooperative of over 100 family farmers and a preserved Amish farm with sustainable farming practices. Please dress appropriately for walking on a farm.

The Susquehanna by Sky

(Needs to meet in the hotel lobby at 1:30 p.m.)

Hosted by: SouthWings, Susquehanna Heritage

Join volunteer SouthWings pilots and issue experts from the Susquehanna Heritage on a guided aerial tour of the Susquehanna River and the Conowingo dam system to learn more about the pollution threat posed to the Bay, land conservation in Lancaster county, and connectivity between the Susquehanna the surrounding watershed. While aboard consider how your organization may use conservation through aviation as a tool to highlight your priority issues from the air and influence environmental decision making.

Plainsect Dairy Farm Tour

Hosted by: Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay

Meet Henry Fisher, a young Amish dairy farmer that worked with the Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay to bring his farm into compliance. Mr. Fisher is located in the Nickel Mines subwatershed of the Octoraro Creek Watershed. The Alliance supported Mr. Fisher to install a manure storage facility, stabilize his barnyard, and control the stormwater on his farm. From his work with the Alliance, Mr. Fisher developed a passion for conservation and the health of his watershed.

Lancaster City Green Infrastructure Bike Tour

Hosted by: City of Lancaster

This three-hour bicycle tour will provide participants an opportunity to view more than ten of the City's green infrastructure program implementation projects and talk to staff, property owners, and contractors with firsthand knowledge of the projects. The various projects exemplify the City's key approaches to saving costs by integrating green infrastructure into public works processes and partnerships with private property owners. The City will provide comfortable, easy to ride bikes from its bike share program. The route will use city streets with and without on-street bicycle facilities, so participants should be comfortable riding with traffic. Helmets will be provided.



Making Pictures that Make People Care

This unique hands on workshop will introduce participants into painting a variety of water scenes, such as streams, rivers, lakes and waterfalls while at the same time learning the importance of conservation, what our function is in keeping our waters pristine. Mindfulness Session

Pennsylvania Abandoned Mines, RECLAIM Act, & Reclamation: Community Outreach

The presentation will describe what the Pennsylvania Abandoned Mine Lands Campaign is, who the members are, and what the coalitions support and advocate for in relation to abandoned mine reclamation. The presentation will also highlight and update attendees on the Surface Mining Control & Reclamation Act Title IV Fee Reauthorization efforts in PA and throughout the Chesapeake Bay watershed. Discussions will be around why PA has been so successful in leveraging state, federal, foundation, private sector, co-gen, and coal industry funds to reclaim abandoned mine sites, remediate rivers and streams polluted by past mining practices, and build strong coalitions in underserved communities to improve the quality of life in the coalfields across a very large portion of the Chesapeake Bay watershed and the Commonwealth. The presentation will highlight effective ways to foster collaboration and building organizational capacity within our coalfield communities based on survey results conducted by WPCAMR.
